Hosted by The Inspirational Learning Group, the prestigious competition brings together around 1,000 students from schools across the country to present innovative solutions to real-world challenges set by leading employers. Reaching the Grand Final is a fantastic achievement and reflects the creativity, teamwork and commitment shown by our students throughout the competition.

Unlike many academic competitions, the National Careers Challenge requires students to present their ideas without the use of presentation slides, placing the emphasis firmly on confident communication, collaboration and problem-solving. Throughout the event, our students demonstrated professionalism, resilience and the ability to think on their feet as they pitched their ideas directly to industry professionals. The experience gave them a valuable insight into the skills employers are looking for and the confidence to present their ideas in a high-pressure environment.

YEAR 12 GEOGRAPHERS EXPLORE THE LAKE DISTRICT



Our Year 12 Geography students recently travelled to Grasmere in the Lake District to undertake fieldwork as part of their A Level studies. Set within one of the UK's most iconic landscapes, the visit provided students with the opportunity to investigate physical geography in a real-world environment while developing the practical skills needed for their Non-Examination Assessment (NEA) and future geographical investigations.

Throughout the day, students collected and analysed primary data using a range of geographical fieldwork techniques. They practised key investigative skills, including sampling, environmental observations, data collection and recording, while considering the strengths and limitations of different research methods. The experience helped students understand the importance of designing robust investigations and evaluating the reliability and validity of the evidence they collect.

Alongside the physical geography fieldwork, students explored the impact of tourism on the Lake District National Park. They examined how this world-famous destination balances the demands of millions of visitors each year with the need to protect its unique landscapes, ecosystems and local communities. Through first-hand observation and data collection, students considered both the economic benefits and environmental challenges associated with tourism, applying the geographical concepts they have studied in the classroom to a real-life setting.

Fieldwork is an essential part of A Level Geography, allowing students to develop critical thinking, analytical skills and independence while experiencing geography beyond the classroom. Well done to all of our Year 12 geographers for their enthusiasm, professionalism and excellent engagement throughout the visit, and thank you to the Geography Department for organising another valuable learning experience that brought their studies to life.

Over several days, students navigated challenging routes through the Lake District, carrying all of their own equipment and working together to complete the expedition independently. The expedition required students to apply the skills they have developed throughout their Gold Award journey. Using maps and compasses to navigate unfamiliar terrain, managing campsites, preparing meals and making decisions as a team, they demonstrated excellent leadership, communication and problem-solving throughout the assessment. Despite the challenges of long distances, changing weather and difficult terrain, the groups showed remarkable perseverance, supporting one another and maintaining a positive attitude from start to finish.

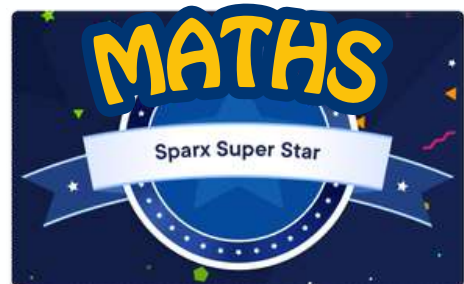

Top Tips for Adopting SAFE & HEALTHY ONLINE HABITS

Everyone has so much going on in their lives, and that includes children: from exams and deadlines to anxiety and mental health struggles. It's quite easy to send memes, make jokes and vent online about the things that irritate us, but when was the last time you – or your child – took a moment to share something kind or positive instead? In fact, when did you last stop and think about your family's online activities? To help keep them safe and teach them healthy online habits, we need to develop our children's digital resilience. There are lots of ways that children can become more digitally resilient, and we've pulled together some popular strategies here...

WHAT IS DIGITAL RESILIENCE?



Resilience doesn't mean being so tough that nothing gets to you, and it's not about "putting up with things" either. Instead, it's the ability to recover from setbacks. Everyone feels sad, worried, scared or upset at times: it's how we respond and adapt to those situations which is important. Digital resilience is about making choices that keep us safe and happy online, even when we're exposed to something negative or upsetting. Building your child's digital resilience will help reduce the impact of potential risks as they engage with and navigate around the online world.

MAKE POSITIVE LIFESTYLE CHOICES



- ✓ Make time for the people and things that make you happy.
- ✓ Monitor your screen time and stick to your limits.
- ✓ On social media, follow people that make you feel good about yourself – and unfollow the ones who don't.
- ✓ Spread some positivity: post good reviews, leave encouraging comments and share good news.

KEEP YOUR HEALTH IN MIND



- ✓ Try to factor in regular breaks offline and away from your screen – ideally, outdoors for some revitalising fresh air.
- ✓ Exercise is a brilliant stress-buster: even a walk around the block, a bike ride or a stroll to your local shop can really work wonders.
- ✓ Be strict with yourself about putting devices away in plenty of time before bed: they can interfere with a good night's sleep, which is essential for staying healthy.

REACH OUT FOR SUPPORT



- ✓ If you have a problem online, don't be afraid reach out to specialist people or organisations that could help.
- ✓ Follow people on socials who have the same values and morals as you.
- ✓ You could always talk to a friend, or a trusted adult like a teacher or family member for some advice.

PUT SAFETY FIRST



- ✓ If you see something online that upsets or worries you, tell a trusted adult about it as soon as possible.
- ✓ You could also report the content that's making you feel uncomfortable to the site or app that you saw it on, so they can look into it.
- ✓ Another option is to block the person or the account that's causing you a problem – or you could go one step further by totally deleting the app you were using.

GET THINGS CLEAR IN YOUR HEAD



- ✓ Ask yourself what kindness online actually looks like. Can you remember the last time someone was kind or supportive towards you online? What did they do?
- ✓ Think about how it makes you feel when someone sends you a positive or funny message online.
- ✓ What about the opposite: has someone ever been deliberately unkind to you online? What did they do and how did it make you feel?
- ✓ If someone's behaviour online is causing you stress, try to remind yourself of all the steps you can take if a person's being unkind online.
